## PROGRAMME

The NATIONAL ANTHEM

Overture 'Midsummer Night's Dream' Op. 21 (1826)
Felix Mendelssohn-Bartholdy
(1809-1847)

This work was written as a concert overture, and seventeen years later, Mendelssohn added the other pieces of incidental music to accompany Shakespeare's play, incorporating themes of the earlier work. The overture is one of the most beautiful; there are themes for the fairies of Oberon's realm, the lovers' moonlight walk and the realistic braying of the donkey: there is a festive flourish for the royal hunt and the work ends quietly, as it began, with a dreamy set of simple chords.

Concerto in A minor, Op. 102 (1887) for violin, cello and orchestra

Johannes Brahms (1833 - 1897)

Allegro Andante Vivace non troppo

This beautiful work is equal to all Brahms' concerti and is receiving many performances nowadays to redress an unfortunate neglect. The first movement opens with a cadenza for both solo instruments and is built on a very grand scale, with impressive motifs and very arresting rhythms; the second subject is a highly memorable and lyrical melody. Throughout the work, the solo parts are as responsible as the orchestral parts for harmonic and melodic development, making a complete and unified composition of the very finest skill and maturity. The simplicity of the middle movement balances the weight of argument of the first; and the final movement is a highly virtuosic rondo, incorporating many subsidiary themes, based on folk material, and providing a lively and fitting conclusion to this extraordinary masterpiece.

Overture 'Die Fledermaus'

Johann Strauss II

Johann Strauss II was born in October 1825, the eldest son of a man famed throughout Vienna for his dance music. 1862 saw his marriage to the first of his three wives, Henrietta Treffz, a singer of repute and it was she who caused him to devote more time to composition. In 1874, he produced "Die Fledermaus", a model of classical operetta and destined to remain the most successful of his major works.

Suite 'Swan Lake'

Peter Ilyitch Tchaikovsky

Peter Ilyitch Tchaikovsky was born in Viatka in 1840 and died in St. Petersburg in 1893. His music has long been popular in the West mainly due to its wealth of melody and brilliant orchestration. "Swan Lake" is one of his most well-loved works, although the premiere in 1877 at the Bolshoi Theatre was a dismal failure. This evening we are playing four movements:-

Scene; Dance of the Swans; Hungarian Dance; Waltz.

Selection 'The Desert Song'

Sigmund Romberg

Sigmund Romberg was born in Hungary in 1887 and died in New York in 1951. He was a popular composer of operettas and film music. He settled in New York in 1913 and later moved to Hollywood, where he produced some of the best loved operettas ever written. The well-loved tunes of the Desert Song, the romance and lure of the Red Shadow and the Desert Rifs have made this a perennial favourite.

Fantasia on British Sea Songs.

Sir Henry Wood.

Sir Henry Wood's name is indelibly linked with the Promenade Concerts. It was in 1893 that Robert Newman, the Manager of the Queens Hall, London, offered Henry Wood the conductorship of a new Queens Hall Orchestra. So began the Henry Wood Promenade Concerts which he conducted, from 1895 to 1941, when the Queens Hall was destroyed in an air raid.

This piece has long been considered indispensable for the last night of the Promenade Concerts Season.

We are especially pleased to welcome back as soloists tonight two musicians who played with the "Gorton" in their formative years. Tom was orchestra leader and Stephen leader of the cello section. Both are now members of the B.B.C. Philharmonic Orchestra.
