


THEAR you calling me

# GORTON PHILHARMONIC SOCIETY.

One of the most successful seasons of the Gorton Philharmonic Society was concluded on Sunday last in the Belle Vue Gardens (by kind permission), before one of the largest attendances. Under the able leadership of Mr J. F. Ridgway, the society's full orchestra gave another of their high standard programmes of music, the time and tuning leaving nothing to be desired. The efforts included: March, "Lorraine" (Ganne); overture, "Hungarian Lust spiel" (Keler Bela); symphony, "Un finished" (Schubert); suite from "Th. Bavarian Highlands" (Elgar). The most taking piece on the programme was the rendering of "The Grasshopper's Dance" (Bucalossi), for which, in response to encore demands, a portion was repeated. The overture, "Ruy Blas" (Mendelssohn) and the selection "Aida" (Verdi) were also finely contributed. Vocalists at these rehearsa"s are always accorded a warm reception, and Mr William A. Stark, who appeared last Sunday, was well received. His efforts were "I hear you calling me" (Marshall), and (a) "An Eriskay Love Lilt" (Foster) and (b) "O Rose of Morn" (Mann). Deserved encore honours were very appreciatively given for his pleasing tone and expression, and he replied with "Hatfield Bells." Every praise is due to the society's accompanist, Miss E. Dodd, A.R.C.M., for the able manner in which he has officiated throughout the season. The annual concert is to be held in the Belle Vue Gardens on the 21st of the present month.

The closing rehearsal for this season of the Gorton Phharmonic Society on Sunday morning at Belle Vue was marked by another huge attendance, which emphasised the impression that the session has probably been the most popular on record. The programe and playing of the fine orchestra, under Mr. J. F. Ridgway, were worthy of the occasion. Every selection was a melodious "gem of purest ray serene," and was played with real interpretative skill. The opening march, "Lorraine" (Ganne), with its gaiety, in which not a sad note entered; the delicious and wonderful inspiration of the overture, "Hungarian Lustspiel" (Keler Bela); and the exceeding "Lorraine" (Ganne), with its gaiety, in which not a sad note entered; the delicious and wonderful inspiration of the overture, "Hungarian Lustspiel" (Keler Beia); and the exceeding picturesqueness of "The Grasshoppers' Dance" (Bucalossis) were compositions that more directly appealed to the responsive chords of the listeners. There was no luck of delighted appreciation of the (perhaps) more intellectually intricate symphony, "Unfinished" (Schubert); suite from "The Bavarian Highlands" (Elgar); selection, "Aida" (Verdi); and overture, "Ruy Blas" (Mendelssohn). The vocalist of the morning, Mr. William A. Stark, tenor, excelled in expression rather than in strength of voice. His items were "I Hear You Calling Me" (Marshall), "An Eriskay Love Lilt" (Foster), "O Rose of Morn" (Mann), and, for encore, "Hatfield Bells." The encore which the orchestra received for embodying the enchantment of "The Grasshoppers' Dance" was interesting, in view of the classics presented which did not meet with such distinction, loudly applauded as they were. The accompanist was Miss E. Dodd, A.R.C.M.
