March—"STARS AND STRIPES FOREVER" Sousa
John Philip Sousa (1854-1932) was an American band-conductor of international reputation and the composer of many stirring marches including The Washington Post, Semper Fidelis and tonight's march, probably one of the best known marches ever written.
Waltz—"DER ROSENCAVALIER" Strauss
Der Rosencavalier or The Cavalier of the Rose is an opera by Richard Strauss (1864-1949). Der Rosencavalier is the ceremonial bearer of a rose from a gentleman to his betrothed, the bearer in this case winning the girl for himself instead.

CHILDREN'S OVERTURE	Quilter

This overture by Roger Quilter (1877-1953), based on nursery-rhyme tunes adroitly strung together, was originally designed for the play "Where the Rainbow Ends" (to which Quilter wrote the music) though it was not in fact so used.

KARELIA SUITE Sibelius

The Karelia Suite takes its name from a province in the south east of Finland. Its composition followed a request from Viborg University for incidental music for a historical pageant devised by the students. Sibelius only allowed the Overture (Op.10), Intermezzo, Ballade, and Alla Marcia (Suite Op.11) to survive in published form.

SYMPHONY IN D MINOR (Last Movement) Franck

Cesar Franck (1822-1890) was a composer whose work improved as he matured. This, his only symphony, is considered to be among his finest works. Debussy in his capacity of newspaper critic felt able to write of Franck as "one of the greatest" of the great musicians.
